Employees with skill level 4 earn almost £500 more than employees with skill level 1.






# 26.5% economic inactivity rate (316,000) (aged 16-64) (May-July 2025) The second highest rate of the twelve UK regions.


## Reasons for inactivity differ by gender



Reasons for economic inactivity for females have changed since pre pandemic levels – in 2025 (May-July) long-term sickness accounts for over 33% of economic inactivity, an increase of 10 pps since 2019.




Males consistently report long-term sickness as the main reason for economic inactivity.



The economically inactive is largely made up of those with lower level qualifications, with over 27% having no qualifications, and only 1-in-10 holding a degree or higher.





**5,000** students entered GB higher education institutions in 2023/24; an annual fall of 11%.

# 1,200 from GB entered NI HEIs

(undergraduate & postgraduate).

Part-time undergraduates are most likely to study in NI - 91% study locally compared with 72% who study full-time.
